I.	Call to Order Co-Chair Nancy Borchard called the meeting to order at 10:00 a.m.		
II.	Approval of the Agenda Ms. Borchard asked the committee to review and approve today's agenda. Ratan Bhavnani moved to approve, Gray Wilking seconded. The motion carried unanimously.	The agenda was approved as written. M/S/C	
III.	Approval of the Minutes Ms. Borchard asked the committee to review and approve the minutes of the December 5, 2019 meeting. Sheri Valley moved to approve, Mr. Bhavnani seconded. The motion carried unanimously.	The minutes were approved as written. M/S/C	
IV.	Welcome and Introductions Ms. welcomed everyone and asked for introductions. She reminded all that to be appointed as a member, individuals needs to attend three meetings and request appointment. Regular participation ensures continued membership.		
V.	Public Comments Diane Bustillos spoke about her loved one who has been struggling for 17 years. He is desperate for help. VCBH has advised him that there is no housing available in the county, so he has been living on the streets. The system has let him down. Structured residential housing needs to be a priority, especially for the seriously mentally ill.		
VI.	Chair Announcements – Nancy Borchard The BHAB Lanterman, Petris, Short (LPS) Workgroup has been looking at whether LPS is a barrier to needed services. The state is looking into this also. Mr. Harris noted that LOPS is the law that governs involuntary commitment. It was first enacted in the 1960s. Cece Casey made a public announcement. She stated that because of grave disability, loved ones easily decompensate under stress. She would like to have conservatorship hearing happen less frequently than every year.		

	<p>The ARCH at Ventura, a year-round shelter for adults, has opened. As part of a good neighbor policy, it does not accept walk-ups. Susan White Wood, VCBH Housing Manager, explained that clients need to go through the coordinated entry system (VCBH, Human Services Agency, Salvation Army, and any organization in the Homeless Management Information System). Shelter staff work intensely with the residents to prepare a housing plan to move them out into housing; they also provide services and referrals. Ventura residents get priority. Dr. Schipper noted that The ARCH opened four days prior; it currently shelters ten people and a hundred people have been referred. The shelter in Oxnard was at capacity (110 beds) within two weeks.</p>		
<p>VII.</p>	<p>Presentation: Housing Authority of the City of San Buenaventura (HACSB) – Denise Wise, Chief Executive Officer, and Karen Flock, Deputy Director, Real Estate Development</p> <p>The agency has two primary functions:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - public housing. HACSB manages the funds provided by the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), both operating subsidy and capital funds; in 2016 capital funds were under \$1 million for 718 units, so improvements must be phased over time. - Section 8, or housing choice voucher program; HACSB provides subsidy to the landlord. <p>In both programs, tenants do not pay more than 30% of their income toward rent.</p> <p>Around 2013, HUD started the Renter Assistance Demonstration Program (RADP). In the five years of this program, HACSB has made over \$200 million in improvements to the housing stock. HACSB now has over 1,000 units.</p> <p>HACSB also property manages its properties. A few years ago, there was a change in the tenants’ demographics, with an increase in older adults and people with a mental illness. Calls for help with these tenants were made to Adult Protective Services, the Crisis Intervention Team and VCBH but were not successful, until eviction notices were served.</p> <p>Karen Flock provided an overview of several properties that are either open or being developed: Snapdragon Place II, El Portal, Castillo Del Sol, Willett Ranch. See attached.</p> <p>HACSB houses over 2,500 people. The waiting list has over 10,000 households.</p> <p>HACSB has contracted with Ventura County Area Agency on Aging (VCAAA) for mental health services. This is a solid partnership for the past five years.</p>		
<p>VIII.</p>	<p>Members and Participants Comments</p> <p>Jerry Harris noted that he recently participated in a meeting of the California Association of Local Behavioral Health Boards & Commissions (CALBHB/C). He raised three issues that the Ventura County BHAB is addressing: the need for more psychiatric inpatient beds and step-down beds; the need to have medical screenings done at the Crisis Stabilization Unit (CSU) and to allow law enforcement to bring individuals directly to the CSU rather than the emergency room; and not enough Mental Health Services Act (MHSA) funding being used for the Seriously and Persistently Mentally Ill (SPMI). He encouraged all to speak at the BHAB General meeting on April 20th when public comments will be accepted on the MHSA Three-Year Plan. Kiran Sahota noted that if any substantive changes are requested at that time, VCBH would make the changes before submitting the MHSA here-Year Plan to the Board of Supervisors.</p> <p>Ms. Sahota noted that the state is looking at taking away the percentages attached to spending on Community Support Services (CSS) or treatment, Prevention, and Innovation. VCBH would lose its prevention programs if focusing on treatment. The state is looking into focusing MHSA funds to address housing the homeless, drug treatment, and the mentally ill who are incarcerated. Ms. Sahota also noted that there is limited funding and MHSA cannot pay for both inpatient and outpatient care.</p> <p>Gray Wilking provided information on a cooperation between VCAAA and VCBH. The new comprehensive case management program, Program to Encourage Active and Rewarding Lives (PEARL), will work with older adults and people with disabilities at risk of developing depression.. Under this program, case managers will visit clients in their home eight times within three months, then provide follow-up. The goal is to help clients be more involved in the community. A social</p>		

	worker will assess individuals for appropriateness to the program. Ms. Sahota noted that this is funded under MHSA Prevention & Early Intervention, referrals can be made by first responders and the community.		
IX.	<p>Ventura County Behavioral Health (VCBH) Updates</p> <p>A. Adult Division – Dr. John Schipper, Adult Division Chief</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ VCBH has submitted a request for a grant for the Mental Health Diversion program with the goal of reducing the number of clients who are admitted to a state hospital. Under this grant, VCBH has prepared a plan to treat 18 clients in three years. ○ There are three potential public/private partnerships: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - St. John’s Hospital is looking for a place to build its own Crisis Stabilization Unit (CSU). - Alvarado Parkway Institute (API) has approached VCBH; it has secured a property in Santa Paula for a Crisis Residential Treatment (CRT). It is also looking at East County for a CSU. - A contractor has approached VCBH with interest in developing a locked Mental Health Rehabilitation Center locally with 45 beds or more. ○ The Mental Health & Safety Task Force, organized by Supervisor Parks to learn from the Borderline mass shooting, has made many recommendations. One is to have a practice guideline to standardize the completion of 5150 involuntary holds. <p>B. Substance Use Disorders – Anna Flores</p> <p>In Ms. Flores’s absence, Dr. Schipper noted that Alcohol & Drug Programs had a successful audit of its Drug Medi-Cal Organized Delivery System (DMC-ODS) by External Quality Review Organization (EQRO). EQRO stated that VCBH is ahead of other counties.</p> <p>C. Mental Health Services Act (MHSA) – Kiran Sahota, MHSA Manager</p> <p>As a whole, the county is hampered by the Not In My Back Yard (NIMBY) mindset and needs more private entities willing to build partnerships with VCBH.</p>

VI.	<p>Anuncios de la presidencia - Nancy Borchard El grupo de trabajo BHAB Lanterman, Petris, Short (LPS) ha estado analizando si LPS es una barrera para los servicios necesarios. El estado también está investigando esto. El Sr. Harris señaló que LOPS es la ley que rige el compromiso involuntario. Fue promulgada por primera vez en la década de 1960. Cece Casey hizo un anuncio público. Ella dijo que debido a una discapacidad grave, los seres queridos se descompensan fácilmente bajo estrés. A ella le gustaría que la audiencia de curatela ocurriera con menos frecuencia que todos los años.</p> <p>El ARCH en Ventura, un refugio para adultos durante todo el año, ha abierto. Como parte de una política de buen vecino, no acepta visitas. Susan White Wood, Gerente de Vivienda de VCBH, explicó que los clientes deben pasar por el sistema de entrada coordinada (VCBH, Agencia de Servicios Humanos, Ejército de Salvación y cualquier organización en el Sistema de Información de Gestión de Personas sin Hogar). El personal del refugio trabaja intensamente con los residentes para preparar un plan de vivienda para trasladarlos a la vivienda ; que también proporcionan servicios y referencias . Los residentes de Ventura tienen prioridad. El Dr. Schipper señaló que The ARCH abrió cuatro días antes ; Actualmente alberga a diez personas y cientos de personas han sido derivadas . El refugio en Oxnard estaba a capacidad (110 camas) en dos semanas.</p>		
VII.	<p>Presentación : Autoridad de Vivienda de la Ciudad de San Buenaventura (HACSB) - Denise Wise, Directora Ejecutiva, y Karen Flock, Subdirectora, Desarrollo Inmobiliario T que la agencia tiene dos principales funciones:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - vivienda pública. HACSB administra los fondos proporcionados por el Departamento de Vivienda y Desarrollo Urbano (HUD) , la subvención y que operan de capital de fondos; en 2016, los fondos de capital fueron inferiores a \$ 1 millón para 718 unidades , por lo que las mejoras deben ser escalonadas con el tiempo. - Sección 8, o programa de vales de elección de vivienda ; HACSB proporciona subsidio al propietario. <p>En ambos programas, los inquilinos no pagan más del 30% de sus ingresos para el alquiler.</p> <p>Alrededor de 2013, HUD comenzó el Programa de demostración de asistencia para inquilinos (RADP) . En los cinco años de este programa, HACSB ha realizado más de \$ 200 millones en mejoras al inventario de viviendas . HACSB ahora tiene más de 1,000 unidades.</p> <p>HACSB también propiedad administra sus propiedades . Hace unos años, hubo un cambio en la demografía de los inquilinos , con un aumento en los adultos mayores y las personas con una enfermedad mental. Ver adjunto.</p> <p>HACSB alberga a más de 2.500 personas. La lista de espera tiene más de 10,000 hogares .</p> <p>HACSB ha contratado con la Agencia del Área del Envejecimiento del Condado de Ventura (VCAAA) para servicios de salud mental. Esta es una asociación sólida durante los últimos cinco años.</p>

Jerry Harris señaló que recientemente participó en una reunión de la Asociación de Juntas y Comisiones Locales de Salud del Comportamiento de California (CALBHB / C). Planteó tres cuestiones que el BHAB del condado de Ventura está abordando: la necesidad de más camas para pacientes hospitalizados psiquiátricos y camas reductoras ; la necesidad de que se realicen exámenes médicos en la Unidad de Estabilización de Crisis (CSU) y de permitir que la policía lleve a las personas directamente a la CSU en lugar de a la sala de emergencias; y no se están utilizando suficientes fondos de la Ley de Servicios de Salud Mental (MHSA) para los enfermos mentales graves y persistentes (SPMI). H e animó a todos a hablar en la reunión BHAB

general el día 20 Abril ^{xx} cuando se aceptarán comentarios del público sobre el Plan de tres años MHSA . Kiran Sahota señalar que si se solicita a cualquier cambio sustancial en ese momento, VCBH haría los cambios antes de presentar la MHSA aquí Plan de - Año t o la Junta de Supervisores.

La Sra Sahota señaló que el estado está mirando quitando los porcentajes fijados al gasto en Comunidad Ayuda S ervices (CSS) o tratamiento, P revención y la Innovación . VC BH podría perder su prevención programas si se centra en el tratamiento. El estado está buscando enfocar los fondos de la MHSA para atender a las personas sin hogar, el tratamiento de drogas y los enfermos mentales que están encarcelados. La Sra. S ahota también señaló que hay fondos limitados y que MHSA no puede pagar tanto la atención hospitalaria como la ambulatoria.

Gray Wilking proporcionó información sobre una cooperación entre VCAAA y VCBH. El nuevo programa integral de manejo de casos , el Programa para Fomentar Vidas Activas y Recompensadoras (PEARL) , trabajará con adultos mayores y personas con discapacidades en riesgo de desarrollar depresión. . Según este programa, los administradores de casos visitarán a los clientes en su hogar ocho veces en tres meses y luego darán seguimiento. El objetivo es ayudar a los clientes a involucrarse más en la comunidad. Un social

El trabajador evaluará a las personas para determinar si son apropiadas para el programa. La Sra. Sahota señaló que esto está financiado por MHSA Prevention & Early Intervention, los primeros respondedores y la comunidad pueden hacer referencias.

IX. Actualizaciones de Ventura County Behavioral Health (VCBH)

A. División de Adultos - Dr. John Schipper, Jefe de División de Adultos

- VCBH ha presentado una solicitud de subvención para el programa de Desviación de Salud Mental con el objetivo de reducir la cantidad de clientes que ingresan en un hospital estatal . Bajo esta subvención, VCBH ha preparado un plan para tratar a 18 clientes en tres años.
- Existen tres posibles asociaciones público / privadas:
 - St. John's Hospital está buscando un lugar para construir su propia Unidad de Estabilización de Crisis (CSU) .
 - Alvarado Parkway Institute (API) se ha acercado a VCBH; se ha asegurado una propiedad en Santa Paula para un Tratamiento Residencial de Crisis (CRT). También está buscando en el este del condado una CSU.
 - Un contratista se ha acercado a VCBH con interés en desarrollar un Centro de rehabilitación de salud mental cerrado localmente con 45 camas o más.
- La Oficina de Tarea de Salud y Seguridad Mental , organizada por Supervisor Parks para aprender del tiroteo masivo en el límite, ha hecho muchas recomendaciones. Una es tener una guía práctica para estandarizar la finalización de 5150 retenciones involuntarias.

OUR SON HAS BEEN IN THE SYSTEM FOR 17 YEARS. HE IS 35 YEARS OLD. HE'S LOSING THE BATTLE ON WELLNESS, HIS DESIRE TO ACHIEVE HIS GOALS DISSOLVED, BUT AT THE SAME TIME, PLEADING FOR HELP. He has been in and out of boarding cares, room and boards, psychiatric hospitals and the crisis residential center. He's been in the emergency room multiple times resulting from traffic accidents, assaults, ect. He ran into a police station because he was being chased and ended up in psych. Hospital out of County. He is worse off now than he was 17 years ago. And unless he meets criteria for Hillmont there's nothing VCBH can do for him. He has been sleeping outside my front door because he is too paranoid to stay at the homeless shelter and we cannot have him in our home, he is scared and confused and wants help so badly but sometimes symptoms prevent him from trusting others.

OFTEN HE WALKS TO VCBH DESPERATE FOR HELP. HE'S TIRED. HE IS COGNITIVELY IMPAIRED, AND AROUND EVERY CORNER THERE IS THE OPPORTUNITY TO MAKE POOR CHOICES AND NOW HIS PHYSICAL HEALTH IS DECLINING AS WELL. WITH NO DIRECTION, NO STRUCTURE, NO FUTURE. IT'S UNDERSTANDABLE WHY HE MADE THOSE POOR CHOICES.

WHY WOULD ANYONE CHOOSE TO LIVE IN A SUBSTANDARD BOARD & CARE WITH NO SERVICES OR SUPPORT? WHY WOULD ANYONE WANT TO PICK UP CIGARETTE BUTTS OFF THE STREET, WHY WOULD ANYONE WANT TO BE CALLED LAZY, WHY WOULD ANYONE WANT TO LIVE ON SSI FOR THE REST OF THEIR LIVES. WHY WOULD ANY 35 YEAR OLD PERSON WANT TO HANG OUT WITH THEIR PARENTS BECAUSE THEY HAVE NOTHING. LOW SELF ESTEEM, NO MOTIVATION. HE'S A SMART PERSON, HE HAD A BRIGHT FUTURE. BUT THE SYSTEM HAS FAILED HIM. HE DOESN'T FEEL WORTHY, DOESN'T FEEL HE DESERVES FAIR TREATMENT. HE DOESN'T WANT TO FAIL, BUT FAILURE IS EASIER THAN RISK DEALING WITH THE REAL WORLD AND ALL THAT WOULD BE EXPECTED OF HIM AND ALL THE WHILE BEING STIGMATIZED.

BUT HE DOES DESERVE TO BE TREATED FAIRLY AND HAVE DECENT HOUSING. HE DOES DESERVE A STRUCTURED ENVIRONMENT AND TO HAVE POSITIVE ROLE MODELS IN HIS LIFE. **STRUCTURED RESIDENTIAL HOUSING NEEDS TO BE A PRIORITY, ESPECIALLY FOR THE SERIOUSLY MENTALLY ILL.**

IF THOSE WITH MENTAL HEALTH CHALLENGES ARE JUST GIVEN THE CHANCE, THEY CAN HAVE A BETTER FUTURE. IF MY SON CONTINUES ON THIS DOWNWARD SPIRAL, I'M AFRAID HE WILL NOT BE WITH US MUCH LONGER.

AFTER 15 PLUS ARRESTS LAST YEAR, HE WAS DECLARED INCOMPETANT BY VCBH FORENSIC PSYCHOLOGIST. AFTER SERVING 3 MONTHS IN JAIL, HE WAS SET TO GO TO SYLMAR OR SIMILAR LOCKED

FACILITY. BUT WHILE HE WAS IN JAIL HIS COMPENTANCY WAS REINSTATED; THEREFORE, NO SYLMAR, NO SECURE HOUSING, NO GUIDANCE, NO PROGRAMS, NO NOTHING. HE WAS RELEASED WITHOUT A PLAN.

**HE HAS BEEN ADVISED BY VCBH STAFF THERE ARE NO BOARD & CARE HOMES OR ANY HOUSING AVAILABLE IN THE COUNTY. SO HE HAS BEEN LIVING ON THE STREETS.*

THE SYSTEM HAS LET HIM DOWN AND IT IS SHAMEFUL.

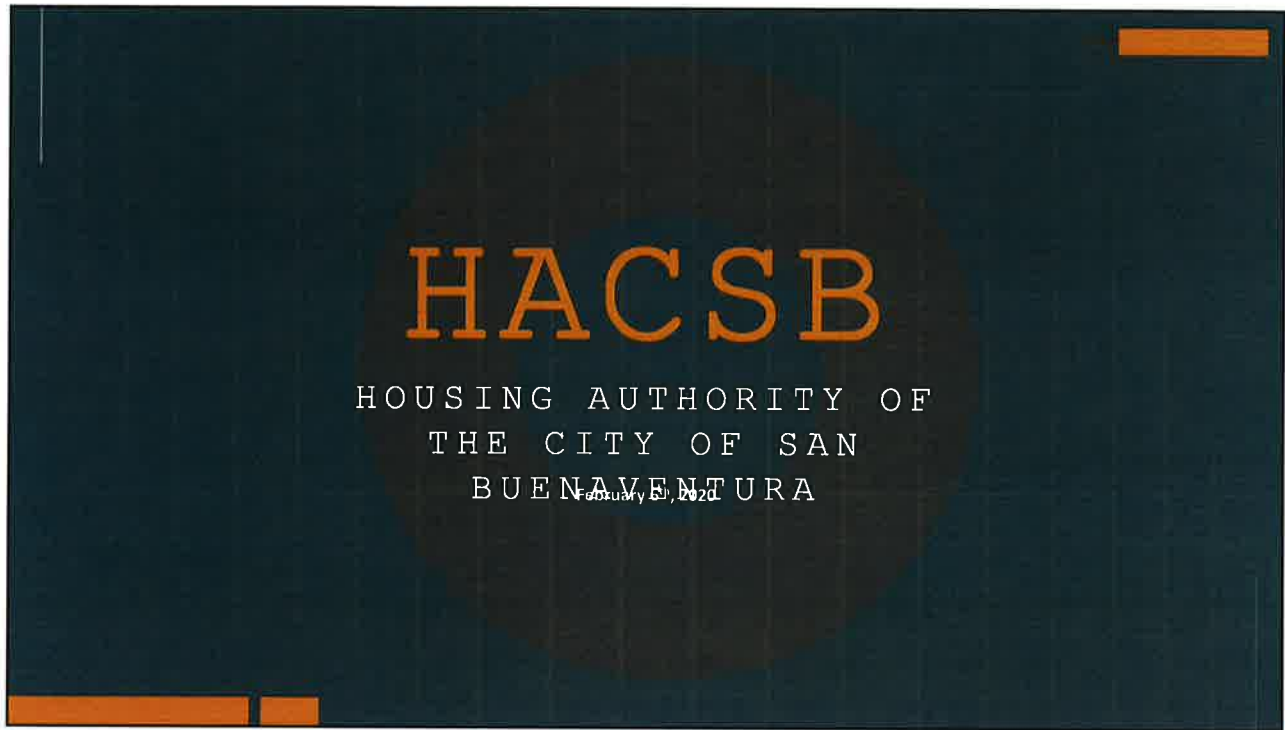

- *There are a small amount of beds reserved for non-social service providers. Please call to determine availability.*
- *All guests must have a verified negative TB test within the last 6 months, be able to ambulate independently, and provide self-care, and will be screened for the National Sex Offender Public Records search prior to acceptance.*
- *Animals are allowed.*
- *Shelter operations will be supported by professionally trained staff and security 24/7.*
- *No weapons, drugs, or alcohol will be permitted in or around the shelter.*
- *Services at this location will include a bed, meals, and the opportunity to shower, as well as Housing Navigation services and connection to resources.*
- *A complimentary shuttle will be available for clients who do not have their own personal motor vehicles.*

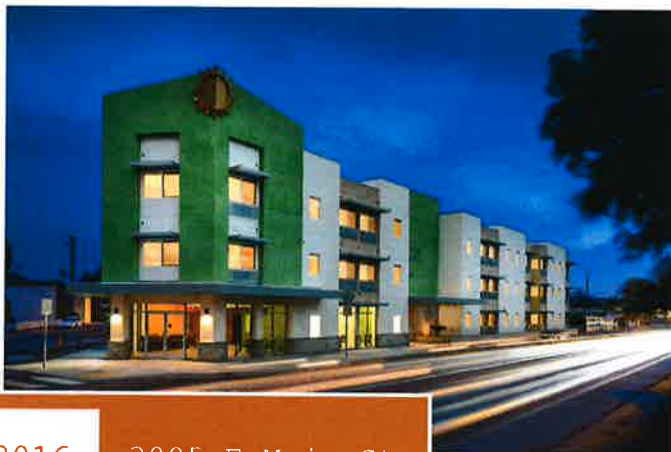

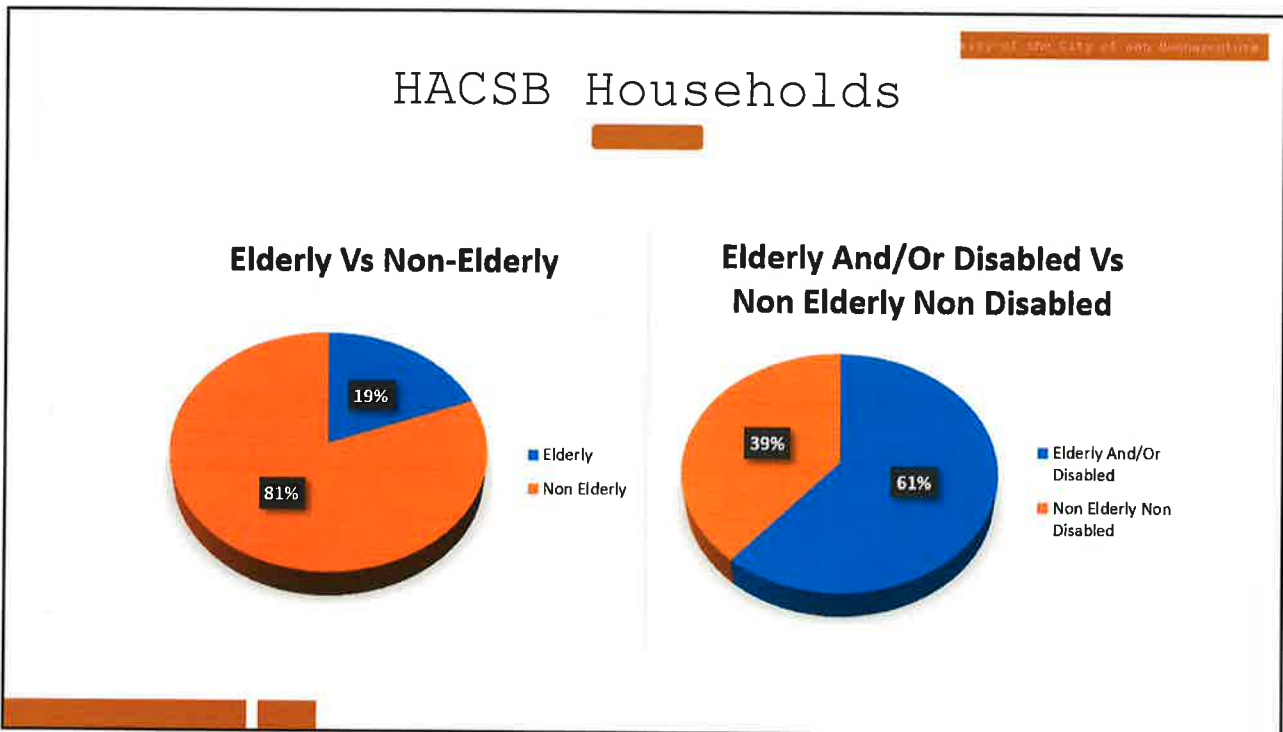
