I.	Call to Order Chair Gardner called the meeting to order at 3:15 p.m.		
II.	Approval of the Agenda Ms. Gardner asked the Committee to review and approve today's agenda. Claudia Armann moved to approve, Katherine Kasmir seconded. The motion carried unanimously.	The agenda was approved as written. M/S/C	
III.	Approval of the Minutes Ms. Gardner asked the committee to review and approve the minutes of the October 8, 2019 meeting. Maya Lazos moved to approve, Theresa Plante seconded. The motion carried unanimously.	The minutes were approved as written. M/S/C	
IV.	Welcome and Introductions Ms. Gardner welcomed everyone, thanked Ms. Lazos for the cookies she brought, and asked for self-introductions.		
V.	Chair Announcements A. To honor the victims of the Borderline shooting, the Healing Garden in Thousand Oaks was dedicated and a section of the 101 freeway is now named in honor of Sgt. Ron Helus. B. On November 15 the Board of Supervisors (BOS) approved a ban on commercial marijuana businesses in unincorporated areas and directed staff to study a possible exception for Nyeland Acres. Capt. Fryhoff noted that the Sheriff's Office will lead the drafting of an amendment to add cannabis to the Social Host ordinance. C. Per Mark Stadler of the Crisis Intervention Team (CIT), discussions have started regarding the feasibility of opening a sobering center, and funding is being sought. D. The BOS has approved a contract between VCBH and the Ventura County Office of Education (VCOE). Clara Barron gave brief information about this contract. VCOE will train counselors and students on how to recognize signs of behavioral health concerns.		
VI.	Public Comments Ezequiel A. Sanchez made a public comment regarding state certification of peer partners. He noted that under the Washington model, peer partners need to be Licensed Vocational Nurse and not have been hospitalized in a mental health institution for the previous two years. Mr. Sanchez voiced his concern that if this model is applied in California, many clients would not qualify to work as peer partners. Stuart Fiedler spoke briefly about Taxation Code 19280, which he views as pre-emptive prevention.		
VII.	Ventura County Behavioral Health (VCBH) Staff Updates A. Dan Hicks, ADP Prevention Services Manager 1. The results of a Request For Proposal (RFP) will soon be released regarding ADP Prevention efforts.		

	<p>2. An event was recently held to mark the completion of the first year of the County Opioid Abuse Suppression Task Force (COAST), a multi-agency collaboration. VCBH debuted a trailer of a video to be used at briefings of first responders; it addresses the Do's and Don'ts at fatal overdose scenes. VCBH is scrupulous on collecting data on overdoses and on naloxone kit training.</p> <p>3. Prevention was successful in getting funding from the Office of Traffic Safety (OTS) for a project called "Prescription for Impairment." The new project focuses on preventing prescription drug impaired driving.</p> <p>B. Clara Barron, MHSA - MHSA Three-Year Plan Information Ms. Barron distributed and reviewed two documents: the MHSA Program Planning Summary FY 20/21 through 22/23 & Update to FY 19/20, and the Program Work Plan. She noted that per regulations, 51% or more of MHSA funding must be used for Full Service Partnership (FSP) programs. Prevention and Early Intervention (PEI) is another component of MHSA, with five areas: outreach, stigma reduction, prevention, early intervention, access and linkage. Due to time constraints, Ms. Gardner asked Ms. Barron to end her presentation and rather than rush today's update, she asked her to give a Time Certain presentation at the January meeting. Ms. Kasmir offered to give up her presentation slot so that the MHSA presentation can take place. Ms. Barron noted that questions and comments should be submitted via mhsa@ventura.org by December 15.</p> <p>C. Vicky Gonzales, Public Health Ms. Gonzales was not in attendance.</p> <p>D. Other Staff Update Capt. Fryhoff noted that the state did away with a law that made it illegal for minors to possess cigarettes. Also, marijuana dispensaries are highly regulated, and the ones in Ojai work closely with the Sheriff's Office.</p>		
VIII.	<p>Prevention Committee Member Comments Ms. Lazos noted that Vista del Mar has been working on stigma reduction. It has provided education awareness regarding suicide prevention through training under the Bartenders As Gatekeepers project. Mr. Hicks added that VenturaCountyLimits.org can be searched by subject for various trainings related to ADP.</p> <p>Ms. Kasmir noted that she has given 64 classroom workshops in middle and high schools. Straight Up has hired two new staff. Also, she will present on alcohol and drugs on November 16 during a youth conference organized by Assemblymember Jacqui Irwin.</p>		
IX.	<p>Presentation: Top Five Things You Need to Know About Teens and Vaping – Dan Hicks, ADP Prevention Manager Mr. Hicks distributed a booklet that VCBH put together with Public Health. Both departments are collaborating to address vaping among young people. Mr. Hicks listed five pieces of information regarding teens and vaping:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> # 5: Vaping is ubiquitous among teens. One in three 11th graders have engaged in vaping. # 4: "Vaping" is a misnomer. It is not about water vapor, it is about aerosol. # 3: The ability to conceal this drug delivery system. # 2: Unprecedented vaping-related lung diseases and deaths. # 1: Go to mjfactcheck.org to educate and link up to current information and become an agent of change. The information on this website is updated on a weekly basis. <p>Mr. Hicks noted that as tobacco use has decreased, vaping has increased. A S-T-O-P line (805-201-S-T-O-P (7867) can be called for help to quit tobacco smoking and vaping; it is for people of all ages.</p> <p>Ms. Kasmir noted that in October alone Straight Up, accompanied by some Cal State Channel Islands students, gave eight presentations to parents around vaping. Staff and students are amazed at how little parents know about vaping.</p>		

	Dr. Loretta Denering, VCBH Alcohol & Drug Programs Division Chief, was introduced. Melissa Hannah noted that vaping through pregnancy can cause damage to the baby.		
X.	Old Business A. Prevention Committee Objective – Wording discussion Ms. Gardner noted that after the objectives were approved, Supervisor Parks requested to add to objective # 2: “Advocate for banning flavored vaping products.” Ms. Kasmir moved to approve adding the wording, Ezequiel Sanchez seconded. The motion carried unanimously. B. Fiscal Year 2018-19 Annual Report Ms. Gardner noted that the committee report will go to the full board in January. Ms. Lazos noted that at the previous meeting she had requested to be listed as a member, and her affiliation should be listed as Vista del Mar Hospital. Claudia Armann moved to approve the annual report as amended, Ms. Lazos seconded. The motion carried unanimously.	Amend objective M/S/C Approve Annual Report M/S/C	
XI.	New Business A. Flavored Tobacco Ms. Gardner noted that the BOS is looking at an ordinance calling for an interim licensing program that could include a ban on flavored products in unincorporated areas. B. Tobacco Retail Licenses Ms. Gardner noted that the BOS is looking into preventing tobacco stores from selling cannabis products. C. Moratorium on Opening of Tobacco/Vape Shops Ms. Gardner noted that the BOS is looking into this.		
XII.	Items for the Next Meeting Agenda Mr. Sanchez requested that MHSA be given a regular time slot in future meetings.

VII.	<p>Actualizaciones del personal de Ventura County Behavioral Health (VCBH)</p> <p>A. Dan Hicks, gerente de servicios de prevención de ADP</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Los resultados de una Solicitud de propuesta (RFP) pronto se darán a conocer en relación con los esfuerzos de prevención de ADP . 2. Recientemente se realizó un evento para conmemorar la finalización del primer año de la Fuerza de Tarea de Supresión de Abuso de Opioides del Condado (COAST), una colaboración de varias agencias. VCBH debió un remolque de un video para ser utilizado en sesiones de información de los primeros en responder; que aborda el hacer y no hacer en Fatal sobredosis escenas . La prevención e intervención temprana (PEI) es otro componente de MHSa, con cinco áreas: alcance, reducción del estigma , prevención , intervención temprana, acceso y vinculación. MISSION

To promote measures that prevent mental illness and/or substance use issues from becoming destabilizing components in the lives of Ventura County residents. Our aim is to collaborate and help support education, prevention and early intervention efforts with particular emphasis on community health, engagement and the interaction of mental health and substance use challenges.

2018-19 OBJECTIVES OF THE BHAB PREVENTION COMMITTEE

- 1) Support and collaborate with VCBH and the BHAB in helping to prevent the onset of substance use and mental illness amongst multi-generational populations.
- 2) To promote vaping and cannabis education and awareness.

INTRODUCTION

Participating members in the Prevention Committee include individuals who have an interest in helping to mitigate mental illness and substance use challenges for adults, transitional aged youth and children who reside in Ventura County. Its membership and partners include persons from various entities around Ventura County, including, but not limited to, persons from multiple county agencies, stakeholders, contract providers, VCBH staff, health care professionals, law enforcement and consumers.

Chaired by an appointed BHAB member and reporting directly to the BHAB, this committee shall advocate for greater community awareness of behavioral health risks for individuals with mental illness, a dual diagnosis, or substance use disorder and shall:

- (1) Monitor and advise VCBH regarding its efforts to prevent the onset and exacerbation of behavioral health disorders.
- (2). Comply with the requirements of the Brown Act.

ACHIEVEMENTS

- 1) This past year, the BHAB Prevention Committee has added numerous new stakeholders, a Sheriff's Captain, community participants and providers from various entities throughout Ventura County. These new members have proved to be valued members of the committee.
- 2) The Ventura County BHAB Prevention Committee has supported, collaborated and advocated for information on topics within the scope of Cannabis Education and Awareness for Youth, MHSA, Mental Health Prevention, Early Intervention, and Alcohol and Drug Substance Abuse concerns.
- 3) The BHAB Prevention Committee, stakeholders and staff attendees have shared information on prevention efforts within Ventura County concerning Mental Illness, Opioid use, E-Cigarette usage, Youth Cannabis usage, Suicide prevention and Vaping .
- 4) BHAB Prevention Committee members' attendance at various events have included Cannabis Prevention Awareness presentations, Opioid and Marijuana conferences, Suicide Prevention Conferences and meetings and MHSA Stakeholders Committees and conferences.
- 5) Prevention committee members have attended local NAMI events (National Alliance for Mental Illness); events related to the LGBTQ population; events with Rainbow Umbrella; ADP Prevention Services contractor meetings, and Straight Up's local "Reality Parties for Parents," (both in English & Spanish), and have participated in CAUSE events and meetings.
- 6) The BHAB Prevention Chairperson attended the National Rx and Heroin Convention in Atlanta, Georgia, the Statewide Substance Abuse conference, the Suicide Prevention Conference and numerous other meetings, conferences and summits throughout the year.
- 7) The BHAB Prevention Committee has advocated for cannabis awareness and education for youth, Transitional Aged Youth, and for cannabis awareness programs within VCBH and in collaboration with other stakeholders.
- 8) The BHAB Prevention Committee has advocated for prevention efforts in the Latino community and for others in disadvantaged populations.
- 9) BHAB Prevention Committee members have pooled resources with members of the Rx Opioid and Heroin Workgroup concerning the workgroup's outreach efforts on the Opioid crisis, Fentanyl and E-Cigarette youth usage.
- 10) The BHAB Prevention Committee has supported efforts for MHSA 's regional Needs Assessment, that gathered information from VC Public Health, VC Behavioral Health, the community, stakeholders and VC School Districts.
- 11) BHAB Prevention Committee members attended the NAMI Walk and several NAMI conferences. The BHAB Prevention Committee advocated for efforts for the LGBTQ+ population and attended events and LGBTQ+ local conferences.
- 12) The VC BHAB Prevention Committee advocated for prevention efforts surrounding the Human Trafficking problem in Ventura County.

13) The BHAB Prevention Committee members, stakeholders and providers advocated for and supported the "No O.D." program, DUI –Impaired Driving efforts, Drug Disposal efforts, The Ventura County Office of Education Youth Prevention efforts, Latino Outreach efforts, MHSA-PE & I Mental Health efforts and Law Enforcement's prevention efforts throughout the county.

CHALLENGES

The Prevention Committee acknowledges the following Challenges within Ventura County as related to community needs within the scope of Alcohol & Drug related Prevention Services and MHSAs' Mental Health Prevention and Early Intervention. Challenges are as follow:

- Concerns about increased access to highly potent opiates such as Fentanyl within Ventura County.
- Piecing together funding from various sources to purchase Naloxone for the VCBH ADP Prevention Services Overdose Prevention Project.
- There needs to be an increase in access to prevention services that serve indicated, higher risk populations.
- The impact of broader availability and normalization of cannabis for youth and young adults.
- Implementation of ordinances and guidelines regarding cannabis sales.
- Ordinances and guidelines regarding youth vaping and vape products.
- Suicide Prevention outreach for older adults, men and youth.
- Address emerging issues related to the cultivation of Hemp in Ventura County
- Odor mitigation regarding Hemp fields which may trigger cannabis cravings or use for Tay and other Ventura County residents due to environmental challenges.

RECOMMENDATIONS

- Advocate and support mental health and substance use prevention and early intervention programs, including those in collaboration with providers and contractors.
- Help educate and inform the Board of Supervisors, VCBH staff, other agencies, and the public, on the negative impacts of alcohol and drug abuse.
- Advocate for policy prevention efforts around vaping products for youth and older adults.
- Advocate and support outreach efforts concerning cannabis and the potential harmful effects on youth's still developing teen brains with consistent cannabis usage.
- Increase the number of Prevention Committee members including persons in the community, stakeholders, providers and contractors.
- Search for gaps and needs in services in both mental health and substance use where no prevention methods or programs currently exist.
- Advocate for prevention efforts concerning suicide prevention and mental health challenges.
- Promote education for raising awareness of the negative impacts of Fentanyl and opioid usage.
- Develop a troupe of spokespersons to engage older adults
- Increase services and businesses at Hillmont, St. Johns, and other private hospitals and entities to adopt public and private Mental Health In-Patient and Crisis Stabilization services at these sites.

2019-20 OBJECTIVES OF THE BHAB PREVENTION COMMITTEE

1. Support and collaborate with VCBH and the BHAB in helping to prevent the onset of substance use and mental illness amongst multi-generational populations.
2. Promote vaping and cannabis education and awareness, and advocate for banning flavored vaping products.
